ne of the many benefits of being a member of Scottish Heritage USA is the Scholarship Program. We want to invest in

the next generation of American Scots so that their children and grandchildren will come to cherish and appreciate their Scottish roots as much as we do. Our Scholarship Program involves providing tuition to those students with a keen interest and / or talent in a particular discipline, who might not be able to otherwise afford an immersive experience. This could be piping, drumming, fiddling, or dancing. Regardless, we will strive to assist that student toward his or her goals.

We will be awarding several "Scottish Heritage USA" scholarships to students at the North American Academy of Piping and Drumming as well as the Jink and Diddle Scottish Fiddling School. Additional schools and/or experiences will be forthcoming as we get requests. We will allow each school to choose the students worthy of the scholarship based on its knowledge of a particular situation. However, each student will receive a suitable for framing Certificate from Scottish Heritage USA stating that the scholarship is from our organization.

Your board's Scholarship Committee is in the process of determining how many scholarships at each school will be awarded and will announce the process for applications on our website and in the newsletter as soon as details are finalized with each academy. Please stay tuned for more information.

# NATIONAL TRUST FOR SCOTLAND'S NEW OFFERINGS

National Trust for Scotland's Ali MacLeod spills about the value of partnerships, the newest addition to the Trust's portfolio of properties, and more...

**Q:** The National Trust for Scotland partnership is a key part of Scottish Heritage USA's mission to support Scottish culture, heritage and conservation. What has the partnership with our organization meant to NTS?

A: Working with Scottish Heritage USA, both directly and through the National Trust for Scotland Foundation USA, is very important to our charity. Not only has Scottish Heritage USA donated vital funds to enable us to protect and promote the incredible built, natural and cultural heritage in our care, you have helped us to access many opportunities to talk about the places and spaces we care for and why they are important. It is of huge importance to us that Scottish Heritage USA helps us to connect Scots in the US – whether those Scots are of birth, ancestry or inclination – with their history and heritage, and help us to offer an opportunity to connect.

**Q:** Membership through Scottish Heritage USA with the National Trust for Scotland brings free access to your many historic, botanical and heritage sites to our members, as well as supports ongoing operations and programs. Can you tell us about NTS's latest addition of the Mackintosh at the Willow in Glasgow's Sauchiehall Street?

A: This is a very important and exciting acquisition for our charity, ensuring that the wonderful Mackintosh and MacDonald designed tearooms on Sauchiehall Street, in Glasgow, are saved and open for all to enjoy. Mackintosh at the Willow dates to 1903 and is the last remaining original of the several tea rooms designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh and his wife Margaret Macdonald for Glasgow entrepreneur Miss Catherine (Kate) Cranston. Early patrons of the tea rooms had never seen anything like these designs before – they quickly became a popular setting in which to socialize, particularly for women. The tea rooms are one of Glasgow's most important contributions towards modernism and they were highly influential in Europe from the moment of their opening.

As many will know, Mackintosh at the Willow was purchased and restored by the Willow Tearooms

Trust between 2014 and 2018, supported by many generous donors. The restoration resulted in one of the most spectacular heritage attractions in the city. While a tremendously popular visitor attraction, the continuance of the site faced jeopardy following the disruption caused to Sauchiehall Street by the second fire at the Glasgow School of Art and the COVID pandemic. Enabled by support from our members and donors, we were able to step up when needed and we are delighted to have secured the property, its heritage, and the wonderful experience it delivers. Members are welcome to enjoy free access to the terrific exhibition – and we hope they will also enjoy tea in the special and sumptuous surrounds!



**Q:** Your popular, award winning podcast Love Scotland is coming up to its 8th season. What stories will the new season bring us?

**A:** We're running a greatest hits package at the moment while work gets underway on the next season, where we'll be focusing on the kings and queens of Scotland, the story behind the Mackintosh at the Willow and few surprises too.
